


What is redistricting?

Redrawing the boundaries of election districts to ensure equal representation.

Enabled or required by:

- United States Constitution
- State of Minnesota Constitution
- Minnesota Statute
- Fridley City Charter Section 2.05





Roles and responsibilities

Redistricting is a cooperative effort by:

- Fridley City Council direction, oversight and approval of a Redistricting Plan (Plan)
- City Manager direction and oversight of the Plan
- City Attorney legal oversight and compliance
- City Clerk general leadership and facilitation
- Geographic Information System (GIS) Consultant census interpretation and mapping tools

Timeline

Date	Milestone
February 15, 2022	Deadline for legislative redistricting
February 28, 2022	City Council Conference Meeting to review proposed Plan
March 14, 2022	City Council to conduct first reading of an ordinance to update the Legislative Body chapter of the Fridley City Code
March 28, 2022	City Council to conduct second reading and adoption of an ordinance to update the Legislative Body chapter of the Fridley City Code
March 29, 2022	City's Plan documents due to the Minnesota Secretary of State
June - August, 2022	Targeted notifications for affected households (post cards) and outreach campaign
August 9, 2022	State Primary
November 8, 2022	General Election



Proposed changes

Wards: No Changes Required

No proposed changes

Fridley City Code § 2.05

2020 Census Population Data

- Ward 1 10,102 (+239, 2.41% over average)
- Ward 2 9,896 (+33, .33% over average)
- Ward 3 9,592 (-271, 2.7% under average)

Precincts: Two Recommended Changes

Ward 3 Precinct 3



Rationale for proposed changes

Polling Place Best Practices

Established by Minnesota Statute, Minnesota Secretary of State and Anoka County Elections Division:

- Fully accessible and ADA compliant
- Large enough to accommodate voting activities
- Free of any non-election activities

Polling Place Considerations

- Michael Servetus Unitarian Church (W2P2)
 - Residential neighborhood
 - Limited parking
 - Property may be changing ownership
 - Congested voting space
- Fridley Covenant Church (W3P3)
 - Residential neighborhood
 - Accessibility concerns
 - Congested voting space
 - Manna Market Food Shelf



Rationale for proposed changes, cont.

Cost Savings


- \$50 per year per precinct for supplies
- Equipment set-up and testing 2 hours per precinct, per election
- Each precinct employs 12-18 Election Judges

Absentee Balloting


Voting Method: 2020 State Primary






Absentee Balloting

Voting Method: 2020 General Election


