Voting hours are Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. – 4:30 p.m., with additional voting hours from 10 a.m. – 3 p.m. on Saturday, August 10. Voters may also vote at the Anoka County Courthouse (2100 3rd Avenue, Anoka).



Spruce Up Your Home, Invest in Your Future: Home Improvement Deferred Loans Now Available

Dreaming of more space for a growing family, an updated kitchen or bathroom, or finally finishing your basement or attic? Senior Deferred Loan applications opened on April 1, 2024, and as of the newsletter publication deadline, funds are still available. And for income-qualified homeowners of all ages, the new Fridley Home Betterment Deferred Loan program is also accepting applications!

Here's how it works:

 Affordable financing: No payment is required until the property is sold or the title is transferred. There is a possibility of complete loan forgiveness if you stay in your home for the 30 year loan term.

- Focus on improvement: Make essential repairs or upgrades to your property. The program includes most interior or exterior maintenance or remodeling, with eligible uses determined during a free site visit.
- Budget-friendly structure: Up to \$20,000 per property is available to homeowners earning up to 80 percent of Area Median Income (AMI), based on household size and Adjustable Gross Income from the borrowers' most recent Federal Tax Return.

Ready to get started? Contact Fridley's loan processor, Center for Energy and Environment, at 612-335-5884 or online at mncee.org/Fridley to see if your income qualifies and discuss your home improvement goals. This program can turn your dream renovation into a reality, while increasing the value and comfort of your home.

Funding for Fridley's Deferred Loans comes from the Metro Area Sales and Use Tax for Housing, and from special legislation approved by the Minnesota legislature in 2023.

Dog Registration

Pet Waste Stations Coming to a Park Near You!

Picking up dog poop is no fun, but seeing dog poop left behind in your parks and neighborhoods is even worse. Additionally, dog poop contains high levels of bacteria and nutrients that can wash into our lakes, river and creeks when it rains. This summer we are reminding all dog owners that City Code requires picking up after your pets right away.

The City has been installing pet waste stations at City parks including Commons, Summit Square, Briardale, Madsen, the Civic Campus and Moore Lake Park (with grant support from the Rice Creek Watershed District) to encourage park users to pick up after their dog. Thank you for keeping our parks an enjoyable place to walk and play!

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Updated Critical Area Rules are Now in Effect

Last year, the City updated its Critical Area ordinance to reflect new State rules regulating land development within the Mississippi River Corridor Critical Area (MRCCA). The MRCCA is a corridor of land along each side of the Mississippi River in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area that encompasses all properties west of East River Road in Fridley. Properties in the MRCCA have been subject to additional zoning standards since the adoption of the Critical Area Overlay District

in 1983. While many of the zoning standards remained the same, changes were made related to land alteration, placement of impervious surface, and vegetation management in ecologically important areas including along the River, its tributaries and bluffs. If you live in the MRCCA and are planning a project in proximity to one of these areas, please visit **FridleyMN.gov/ CriticalArea** or call 763-572-3594 to determine if a Critical Area permit is needed.

Important rules to keep in mind include:

New Terms

The Critical Area District Chapter includes the following new terms are helpful for understanding MRCCA regulations. More information and maps of these areas can be found at **FridleyMN.gov/CriticalArea**:

- Bluffs: Areas with slopes greater than 18% over a distance of 25 feet
- Bluff impact zone: The bluff and land within 20 feet of the bluff
- Intensive vegetation management: The removal of all or a majority of the trees or shrubs in contiguous patch, strip, row, or block
- Shore impact zone: 50% of the required structure setback from the river
- Significant existing vegetation stands: Largely intact and connected plant communities that contain a sufficient representation of the original native plant community

Building and Construction

Structures, impervious surface, and facilities along the river, its tributaries, and bluffs must meet the following design requirements:

Land Alteration Standards (Grading and Filling)

Land alteration in areas near water and on steep slopes increases the risk of soil erosion and the movement of sediment into water. Land alteration permits will continue to be required for any project in the bluff impact zones or that disturb more than 10 cubic yards or 100 feet of soil within 50 feet of a public water or wetland or natural drainage route. The new rules state that:

- Erosion control projects, habitat restoration and repair, and maintenance of existing structures, and water access paths are allowed with a permit in the bluff impact zone (within 20 feet of a bluff). All other activities are prohibited in the bluff impact zone.
- Riprap, retaining walls or other erosion control structures to correct and established erosion problem are allowed with a permit in the bluff impact zone. There are specific design standards and conditions for constructing these structures. The construction of the structures below the ordinary high-water level would continue to require DNR permit or approval.

Vegetation Removal and Management Standards

Retaining vegetation along the river, its tributaries, and on slopes is important to stabilize soil to slow, absorb, and filter stormwater before it runs into the river. Vegetation is also important for retaining the scenic qualities of the river. A permit is now required for intensive vegetation management in bluff impact zones, shore impact zones, significant existing vegetative stands, and areas within 50 feet of a wetland or tributaries except for the following activities:

- Maintenance of existing lawns, landscaping and gardens.
- Removal of vegetation in emergency situations as determined by the City of Fridley.
- The removal of isolated individual trees or shrubs that are not in a contiguous patch, strip, row, or block that does not substantially reduce the tree canopy or understory cover. However, trees over four inches in diameter that are removed from these areas need to be replaced.

Protect the Vote, Inspire the Voters: Become an Election Judge

The City of Fridley is seeking election judges! While ensuring the integrity of our elections, this role offers a uniquely rewarding experience - witnessing and facilitating citizens' fundamental right to vote.

Anna, a seasoned election judge, shared her experience from the March 2024 election. "It was a delightful day. Our group had 17 new voters, and it was fun to watch them get registered and vote. I'm not sure who was more excited, them or me." For Anna, the true joy came from interacting with first-time voters and playing a part in their voting experience.

Serving as an election judge is an opportunity to build meaningful relationships within the community while playing an important role for voters. By facilitating the electoral process, judges help create positive associations with civic engagement from the start - especially for new voters experiencing their first election.

The City will assist approximately 15,000 voters in casting ballots this November, the impact election judges have in ensuring every eligible voter feels informed and at ease throughout the process. From checking in voters to issuing ballots to answering questions, election judges are the face of Election Day.

If you want to make a difference in your community and be part of the democratic process, consider serving as an election judge. You will uphold election integrity while creating lasting memories for first-time voters - moments that could shape their civic engagement for years.

Could your yard use a tree? The City of Fridley's tree sale is now open and offering a variety of reduced cost trees. Trees improve air and water quality, increase property values, lower energy bills, and provide valuable wildlife habitat. Limited quantities available. Limit two trees per species per household. Seed Mixes: Bagged seed mixes are a low-cost way to establish a pollinator patch when precise plant layout is not important. Seed mixes include cover crops to stabilize the soil while the plants establish, which can take up to three years. You may choose to mix seed with plugs for greater visual impact. 

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Sylvan Hills Park Stormwater Improvements

The City was awarded grant funding from the Mississippi Watershed Management Organization to install improvements to manage stormwater within Sylvan Hills Park (6204 Jupiter Rd NE) in conjunction with the upcoming Park System Improvement Project. Grant funded improvements include:

- An underground infiltration system to provide regional treatment for stormwater runoff for an approximately 65-acre drainage area draining to the park via the storm sewer system. This will be situated under an open space area and appear as a mowed field.
- An above ground treatment system comprised of two vegetated infiltration basins connected by a dry creek (creek may hold water during rain events).
- Additional pollinator habitat within the vegetated infiltration basins as well as slopes along the western edge of the park.

The goals of these improvements are to:

- Improve the quality of stormwater runoff prior to discharge into the Mississippi River
- Reduce localized flooding
- Ad recreational and aesthetic benefit to the park
- Add ecological diversity and pollinator habitat

It is expected that these improvements will provide 16.1 pounds of phosphorus removal and 5,000 pounds of sediment removal annually from stormwater discharging to the Mississippi River. Modeling also indicates reduced flooding within the park and surrounding neighborhood during 10- and 100-year storm events. These improvements will be constructed alongside scheduled park work including upgraded sport facilities, playgrounds, and walking loop. Improving Water Quality of East Moore Lake

Along with exciting updates to Moore Lake Park, the City completed construction of the East Moore Lake Biochar and Iron-Enhanced Sand Filter (BIESF) this spring. Prior to the construction of the BIESF, a storm sewer pipe in the southern portion of the park discharged untreated stormwater runoff from an 80-acre drainage area directly into East Moore Lake. Contaminants in this runoff such as fertilizers, plant and leaf material, and sediment contributed excess phosphorus to East Moore Lake which resulted in algal blooms and made the lake less attractive for recreation. Excess phosphorus and algal blooms can also degrade the aquatic environment for fish and other wildlife. While the amount of excess phosphorus in East Moore lake was considered moderate, it still exceeded Minnesota State Standards, resulting in the lake being designated as impaired by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency for Aquatic Recreation. Since the 1980s, the amount of phosphorus in East Moore Lake has been decreasing, although it still sometimes exceeds state standards (see chart of monitoring data collected by Rice Creek Watershed District). The new filter is expected to improve East Moore

Lake's water quality by treating runoff from the

surrounding neighborhood, Gardena Avenue, and the Moore Lake Park parking lot prior to it entering the lake.


How it Works

Stormwater runoff will now first enter a settling pond to remove sediment and then

be pumped into the filter where iron and biochar mixed into the sand will remove phosphorus and bacteria. An estimated 25.9 pounds of phosphorus and 6,427.6 pounds of sediment will be removed each year. While Moore Lake Park no longer has a managed swimming beach, these improvements will enhance recreational opportunities for paddle sports, fishing and other park users. This project was supported with funding from a Clean Water Fund grant from the Board of Soil and Water Resources, a Rice Creek Watershed District grant, Anoka County, as well as the City's Stormwater Utility Fund.

West Moore Lake

West Moore Lake, which receives relatively less stormwater runoff than East Moore Lake has good water quality for a shallow lake in the metro area. It consistently meets the standards



levels. The water is clear, and there's a variety of healthy native plants growing in the lake. While some residents might find the plants a nuisance, they help improve water quality and are a sign that the lake is ecologically healthy.

How to Help

You can do your part to help Fridley's waterbodies healthy by keeping pollutants out of stormwater runoff. This includes decreasing fertilizer use, keeping leaves and lawn clippings out of the street, planting native plants, and picking up pet waste. Residents that live along waterbodies are encouraged to plant a buffer of native plants along their shoreline to help filter runoff from their yards. You can also sign up for the Adopt-A-Drain program to monitor and clean a storm drain near you at MN.Adopt-a-Drain.org.

Fridley Police Reserve Officers have acted as a non-sworn support unity to Fridley Police Officers for several decades. Currently, the reserve unit is accepting applications from individuals who have an interest in law enforcement or serving their community in a volunteer position.

Reserve Officers assist licensed police officers with prisoner transports, motorist assistance

calls, animal calls and administrative duties. They also play a vital role in the safe and successful execution of community events including Fridley '49er Days, Night to Unite and Pumpkin Night in the Park.

Apply for a Bike Locker

Construction is wrapping up at the 61st Avenue Multi-Modal Transit hub at University Avenue and 61st Avenue. The City received an Anoka County Community Development Block Grant to transform the site, which was previously an abandoned gas station, by adding landscaping, seating and other amenities to promote walking, biking and transit. These changes will complement updates to the adjacent bus stop planned for 2028 with the construction of the METRO F Bus Rapid Transit Line.

The site now includes three rentable Dero bike lockers that can be used by transit riders to store their bikes while taking the bus. The 2024 rental period will be available on a first-come,

first-served basis through November 30. Applications for the 2025 Season (January 1-November 30, 2025) will be accepted through September 30.


