We are proud of our new home and are hosting more trainings and county-wide meetings while enjoying the space and accommodations of the new facility. We experienced some changes in the fire division, with our long-time Fire Chief, John Berg, retiring and Fire Marshal Mike Spencer being promoted to Deputy Director/Fire Chief. James Lange was promoted to Fire Marshal and Brian Williams was promoted to Fire Inspector.

Our police division implemented a new body camera system which has been very successful. The fire division emphasized fire prevention and put additional resources towards a fire inspection program. Fire completed over 800 inspections throughout the

city and aim to do even more in the year to come.

No Public Safety department is effective without the cooperation of its citizens. Our department has been fortunate enough to have that commitment. The employees of the Public Safety Department are dedicated to constant improvement in the quality of service provided to the City of Fridley.

It is an honor and a privilege to serve as Director of Public Safety to the City of Fridley and look forward to another great year.



Department Structure








Smoke Alarms & Batteries Installed:






Calls for Service



Golden Nozzle Award

The Golden Nozzle Award is a Peer to Peer award that recognizes one individual a month for outstanding service. Once a Firefighter has received the award they're responsible for choosing the next recipient. Once they have made their selection they send the Fire Marshal the irefighter's name and the reason for their choice. A recipient is announced monthly at EMS drill and their certificate is posted in the Golden Nozzle Display for the month. The goal is to give staff members an opportunity to acknowledge one another for the outstanding work they do everyday.







Training and Drills









Both the fire and police divisions spend significant time training. The fire department has weekly drill under the instruction of fellow fire staff. Firefighters also attend training and conferences provided by outside agencies to be introduced to new ideas that can be adopted into the department's operations. Allina Transportation provides Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training to the firefighters on a monthly basis. The training is required for continued certification of the firefighter EMTs and includes variances for Fridley Firefighters to use drugs and equipment beyond the basic EMT level of service. The police division requires monthly shoots, annual de-escalation, use of force, and first aid training. Both police and fire train with other agencies on large scale events such as train derailments, natural disasters and mass casualty incidents. Officers can also receive specialized training in subjects like tactical operations, drug interdiction and negotiations. Both divisions use training to prepare them to perform their jobs effectively and safely.










Wellness

Each year, the department uses a theme to guide our initiatives. This year, we chose to focus on wellness. Physical fitness is a major component, so staff started incorporating it into their breaks and utilized the recourses at the new Civic Campus. From using the Rice Creek walking paths nearby to climbing the stairs in the fire training tower. A campus fitness room is in the process of being built. Guest speakers were also brought in to cover topics of overall wellness: mind, body and spirit. Dr. Paul Nystrom, an ER physician at HCMC and wellness speaker, was invited to share his knowledge on the importance of sleeping, proper nutrition and exercise. All police and fire staff were invited to attend the free training. Additionally, in lieu of the annual Significant Other Event, the department brought in Kent Williams of Breachpoint to speak with police staff and family members about the mental health challenges associated with this line of work. While it was a theme for 2019, wellness will continue to be an ongoing focus for the department.










DWI Officer

Fridley was awarded a federally financed grant from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to employ a full time DWI officer. The Minnesota Department of Public Safety (DPS), Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) accepted proposals from law enforcement agencies from the top twenty counties with the most impaired-related deaths and serious injuries in Minnesota. Anoka County had the third highest rate of such incidents, falling under Hennepin and Ramsey County. Fridley has seen a 17.1% increase in DWI incidents from 2017 to 2018. The DWI officer is being used to increase driver and pedestrian safety on our roads by taking drunk/impaired drivers off the streets. Officer Shawn Murphy was selected as Fridley's officer. In 2019, he worked DWI enforcement from October 1 through December 31. Below are Murphy's stats from this time period.




Body Worn Cameras

Fridley Police Officers began wearing Body Worn Cameras (BWC) as a department mandate in 2019. This came after extensive research on the use of BWCs, which began in 2016. Staff examined policies, practices and product options before drafting a BWC policy in 2017. With guidance from the League of Minnesota Cities, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the Minnesota Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training, public input, as well as other police departments, Fridley completed its BWC policy.

After comparing the costs and features of the products of numerous BWC vendors, Visual Labs, Inc. was selected as the option that met the needs of the department. To offset costs, Fridley Police applied for and was awarded \$63,000 from the U.S. Department of Justice in federal Grant funds for the BWC program. Visual Labs is a software company that utilizes Android-based smartphones as body-worn cameras. The software allows an officer to take secure HD video, digital images and digital statements. The phone also provides GPS coordinates of the officer, to ensure officer safety. All data captured is automatically uploaded to a secure cloud-based server, which can be retrieved only by authorized personnel.

Fridley Officers began field-testing BWCs in May 2018. Use of the BWCs was voluntary throughout 2018 and became mandatory on January 1, 2019. The use of BWCs ensures complete accountability from initial police contact, to supervisor review, through prosecution. They have proven to be a great tool for the agency, providing a visual record of the great work our officers are doing when responding to calls.



Lights On Program

In September of 2019, Fridley Police joined the Lights On program. The program provides vouchers for a free service to repair a headlight, tail light, brake light or turn signals. When an officer makes a traffic stop for a light out, they can give drivers a voucher instead of a ticket. While they are usually given out during traffic stops, officers can issue them at any time they see someone in in need of one. Vouchers are given out at officers' discretion.

Once a voucher is distributed, the recipient has 60 days to get the repairs done at a participating shop. We partnered with local auto body shop Bona Brothers to do repairs. Lights On also partners with other repair shops including the Bobby & Steve's Auto World chain. After the repairs are made, the shop is reimbursed for the service they provided. It really is that simple.


Neither the police department nor the tax payers incur any cost. Everything is paid for by Lights On via Microgrants. MicroGrants is a Minneapolis nonprofit that raises money from individuals and foundations to pay for the program in the Twin Cities metro area.

This has been a great opportunity for positive interactions with the community and

lighten the financial burden these repairs and tickets bring people. Because ultimately, we want lights repaired to keep roads safe. This program is a win-win for everyone.




