To the Citizens of Fridley

On behalf of the City of Fridley, I am pleased to present the Fridley Public Safety Department's 2022 Annual Report.

This past year, our department theme was, "What is Your Why?". Our leaders thought it was important to remind our staff how vital it is to remember your "why" when you are serving the community. It can be easy to get caught up in our daily tasks and forget the reason we each chose to be a public servant.

Our Public Safety Department had a busy year. In 2022, our Police Division responded to 36,047 calls for service, which is an eight percent increase from the year before and is an all-time high for number of calls. Our Fire Division also saw a significant 12 percent increase at 3,372 calls for service. We have been fortunate to have been fully-staffed throughout the year in order to effectively respond to this uptick in calls.

The Fire Division welcomed 11 new paid, on-call firefighters, as well as the addition of a full-time Community Health Worker. Through the work of this position and non-profit partnerships, we can now refer patients and Fridley residents to a vast array of resources in the healthcare ecosystem. This new role has already been tremendously effective with 29 established agency partnerships and more than 80 residents directly assisted via the program.

Fridley Fire also founded the Fridley Fire Corps program. Eight volunteers from diverse backgrounds have volunteered their skills to benefit our Fire Division in the areas of education, events and community outreach. Throughout 2022, they donated over 200 hours of their time.

Four new police officers were added to the Police Division in 2022. Currently, 16 of our 24 assigned patrol officers have three or less years of experience with Fridley Police. We are grateful for our leadership and long-serving staff who have helped build a department that continues to attract new talent.

In 2022, we enjoyed getting back to in-person meetings and trainings. Lessons learned from the pandemic and civil unrest continue to help us be better prepared for future challenges. For 2023, we have centered department conversations around keeping our

Youth Development

The Fire Division continued to promote youth development in 2022 through programs focused on training and encouraging youth to explore Fire and Emergency services.

Lieutenant Dean Knowles and Firefighter Matt Kruc visit Emergency Medical Technician courses at Fridley High School, adding enhanced skills practice and involvement for students going through the course.

Involvement at Spring Lake Park High School continues to increase as Chief Zikmund sits as the Board Chair of the Opportunities in Emergency Care program. Similar to Fridley, staff visit this classroom to offer enhanced skills practice and exposure to Fire and EMS scenarios and equipment. Beyond EMT, our own Fire Corps member John Lindstrom instructs Seniors in Technical Rescue and

Firefighter I—both of which are hosted at the Fridley Fire Station. These students not only are around firefighters everyday but graduate with numerous certifications that allow job opportunities immediately after high school.

Lastly, through a partnership with Anoka County Career Force, the Fire Division now has two standing paid-internship positions. We welcomed brothers Phil and Andrew Apel last summer who joined as Firefighter/EMT interns. The county program offers paid internships through workplace partnerships such as ours. Beyond working normal shift hours, our interns completed several projects around the station. This program is planned to continue indefinitely and be offered to students in both high school programs.



Household Hazardous Waste Event

The event was sponsored by Anoka County Environmental Services with a goal of promoting the responsible disposal and recycling of household hazardous materials. The event was extremely well-attended, bringing in tons (literally) of items including batteries, aerosol cans, propane tanks, paint, oils, ethanol, prescription medications and more!

There was a successful attendance of 565 households, 64 percent of which were from Fridley.








The Fire Division hosted our annual Fire Prevention Open House during the first Saturday of Fire Prevention Week. The event was coordinated by paid, on-call lieutenant Jeremy Grandstrand and was another success this year. A cool October day brought several hundred residents to the Fire Station 1. Activities included spraying a fire hose, learning to use a fire extinguisher, child safety seat checks, station tours, watching vehicle extrication demonstrations, a police K-9 demonstration and Allina EMS ambulance demonstration.

We also welcomed various vendors to inform residents on railway safety, fire sprinklers, smoke alarms, Dalmatian club, fire and water restoration services, mutual aid partnerships and the many prevention programs done throughout the year here in Fridley.

Community Health



The Fire Division added a new, full-time staff member. Alisa Schuster was hired from our paid, on-call ranks and became the City's Community Health Worker (CHW)/Firefighter. Alisa began in March and worked through the completion of her CHW certificate at Normandale College. The goal of the position is to serve as a resource for residents who, rather than require emergency services, need a myriad of other referrals. Alisa continues to work with residents after a 9-1-1 call to provide resources to improve health and well-being, lessen the burden on our emergency services and help our Fridley residents thrive in their homes.

With the hiring of the CHW, the City also contracted with Care Resource Connection, a local non-profit. In partnership we began the work of the Fridley Community Health Alliance—a conglomerate of non-government organizations, care providers and resources serving the residents of Fridley. Throughout 2022, a new platform was built for these partners to refer patients as well as increased relationships with our senior living facilities who previously accounted for many calls for service. The program has expanded our interest and



reach in involvement with Public Health, Human Services, and numerous county and statewide advocacy groups surrounding Community Health.



In October, the first annual Senior Health Fair was hosted at Fire Station #2. Coordinated by CHW Schuster and supported by Firefighters and Fire Corps volunteers, the Fair included numerous vendors surrounding aging adult health. Plans for 2023 include incorporating a similar event throughout the year and in different formats.

Knowles and many other Firefighters. The team not only coordinates weekly drills for staff, but they also facilitate on-boarding trainings for new recruits, mandated OSHA training, and advanced training curriculum for various topics.



The team began use of Evaluations+, a new software designed for real-time evaluation and feedback to our members. Something we are most proud of is how many of our members, most of whom are paid, on-call have received advanced certifications beyond what is required.


Cops on the Rooftop


Mike Spencer Honored




Police Statistics

Use of Force Incidents by Race




Fridley police officers used force in 196 of the 36,047 calls for service in 2022. As a result, force was only used in .005 percent of all calls Fridley officers responded to.




Police Statistics

What are Part I and II Crimes?

Crimes committed by perpetrators are classified as either Part I or Part II crimes. Part I crimes include homicide, sexual assault, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larcenytheft (shoplifting, pickpockets), motor vehicle theft, and arson. Part II crimes include other assaults, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property (buying, receiving, possessing), prostitution, sex offenses, drug abuse violations, offenses against family and children, driving under the influence, drunkenness, disorderly conduct and all other offenses.

What is the FBI Crime Rate?

A combination of crimes dubbed the more serious "Part I" (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, auto theft and arson) and the less severe "Part II" (narcotics, DWI, simple assault, disorderly conduct, and vandalism) by FBI. The crime rate is compiled based on the number of Part I and Part II crimes committed in a city per 100,000 residents.

What is the Clearance Rate?

Clearance rates measure the number of calls for service involving Part I and Part II crimes leading to various resolutions including warnings, citations or even arrests. The clearance rate is calculated by dividing the number of crimes that are cleared by the total number of crimes recorded.
